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# Birthing a New People: Labor, Moms, and the Work of Pentecost

As a child, one of our school projects in preparation for May 1<sup>st</sup> was to make little paper baskets filled with candies or special treats that we could give to parents, friends, or place "secretly" at a neighbor's door to let them know that they were remembered. Throughout the world the month of May enters with a variety of celebrations—baskets, singing, dancing, maypoles, picnics, outdoor activities, and a variety of folk customs. May Day is tied to welcoming the summer and renewal in creation and friendships.

In the United States, May 1<sup>st</sup> has also become one of the days most associated with care for workers and justice for those who labor. In fact, today it is known as International Workers' Day in the United States, Canada, and a number of countries in Europe, Asia, and Latin America. On May 1, 1886, the holiday was celebrated with a strike demanding better working conditions and shorter working hours. This day was viewed as an opportunity to dream of how all people might be cared for and a more just society created.

Also in May is the celebration of Mother's Day. The clearest modern understanding of this holiday is tied

to an early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday." Mothering Sunday served as a significant tradition in parts of Europe and the United Kingdom held on the fourth Sunday in Lent. For this celebration people would return to their "mother church" —the main church in the vicinity of their home—for a special service and time of connection. There was thanks for the church that has formed them and the faithful who have nurtured them.

In the United States, Mother's Day originates in the years before the Civil War when Ann Reeves Jarvis of West Virginia helped start "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to teach women how to properly care for their children. These clubs would later become a unifying force in the region of the country still divided over the Civil War. In 1868 Jarvis organized "Mothers' Friendship Day," at which mothers gathered with former Union and Confederate soldiers to promote reconciliation.



In a similar vein, the abolitionist and suffragette, Julia Ward Howe, wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation," in 1870 as a call to action asking mothers to unite in promoting world peace and she campaigned for a "Mother's Peace Day."

It would be through the work of Anna Jarvis (daughter of Ann Reeves Jarvis) that the modern Mother's Day would arise. Anna, who remained unmarried and childless her whole life, conceived of a day where the sacrifices mothers and women made for the children in their lives would be recognized and honored. In May 1908 she organized the first official Mother's Day celebration at the Methodist church in Grafton, West Virginia. And that same time, after gaining financial support from Philadelphia department store owner, John Wanamaker, there was a special Mother's Day event drawing thousands of people to one of his retail stores in Philadelphia. Over the next four years this movement would grow to receive federal recognition. Interestingly, Anna's vision of this day was to wear a white carnation as a badge, to visit one's mother, and to attend church.

Later this month we celebrate Pentecost in the Christian church. It is a day when many wear red, we celebrate the proclamation of good news to people of all backgrounds and languages, we join in the vision of a new and renewed community that is inspired by the Holy Spirit and sent to proclaim God's message of love, justice, compassion, and care to the ends of the earth.

Pentecost employs visions of a people rooted in connection and celebration; of being valued and honored; of working for peace; of being drawn together in faith. The Church (of the community of Jesus followers) strived to articulate this dream. And today we are called to continue to dream of what might be possible.

How might we labor for...how might we give birth to... a world that embodies God's grace and mercy today? How might we proclaim God's love and peace? How might we speak into a unsettled world in challenging times?

As we honor those who labor on May Day, as we recognize the women who are or have been important to us and the "mothering church" that has formed us, as we live into the vision of Pentecost and a people and world renewed, there is much for which we give thanks...and there is a holy call to live into God's unfolding dream for us and all of God's people.

This year I will likely make May baskets, just as I did as a youngster. This May I will also wonder with you about the ways the is Spirit moving among us, opening doors, and calling us to be a community filled with passion for peace and promise and witnessing to that work in our world. May we be laborers and nurturers who help to birth God's vision today.

Everybody Just Breathe, Amanda Peterson, RN

Amanda Peterson is an ICU nurse, graduate student, and mother of two. She also served as one of America's frontline workers in the fight against COVID-19.

For nearly a year, Amanda worked in COVID ICU. Every day every patient was admitted with the same diagnosis. The beds filled up, but the mainstays of hospital life—frantic call lights, trays of half-eaten meals, and questions from worried families—disappeared as patient after patient began their own agonizing fight for breath.

Based on her experiences Amanda wrote the book, *Everybody Just Breathe*. Her book is a harrowing, generous, and often irreverent memoir chronicling the longest shift of one nurse's life. This startling debut is a testament to patients and a love letter of camaraderie to fellow COVID nurses. It is also an uproarious depiction of motherhood locked down. Amanda's voice met the COVID pandemic with a timely plea to a nation fatigued: *Everybody Just Breathe!*

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## **Family Spiritual Practices**

I stumbled upon an Instagram post of a blogging family that featured a free "tracker" for hours spent outside. When I first saw it, I snubbed it because it was linked to a new year's resolution. I thought it would be an odd and unobtainable thing to do seeing as the winters in Minnesota are not as kind as this one has been. It then came up on a few different posts from different accounts. I looked at it and saw it was 1,000 hours outside for the year. Around the same time this came up on my feed, I was listening to a podcast that was talking about spiritual practices done as a family. Table grace, bedtime prayers, or going to church, are often what I would confine to spiritual practices that can be done as a family. We try to read a story from our children's Bible at bedtime, but overall, most of our family spirituality would come from being in church. That is not a bad thing, but this podcast challenged me to look at other ways that I could instill faith practices into my children. One way I feel connected to God and feel like I can meditate is walking and spending time outside. How do I instill that into my children? The best way to teach is to model the wished behavior. I downloaded and printed the free tracker. I proposed this idea to my family, and everyone was on board. Who knew coloring a small shape on a coloring page posted on our fridge would get us all excited to reach the same goal! I also didn't share with them that this would be a "spiritual practice". I want that connection to happen through the Holy Spirit and for it to be personal to them. I hope that with small ways we can give our younger one's tools to find ways they can connect with God in their own way. My challenge for families is to look at ways you connect with God and model that to your students. It could be spending time outside, bike rides, volunteering at a nursing home, coloring, conversations; the list is endless. If you're interested, the website for free downloads is www.1000hoursoutside.com. There are also great ways with a simple google search to track miles walked, hours of reading, or maybe 1,000 seems like a steep goal. You could also use a paper chain to add or take away from and use that as a visual goal.

I would love to hear about ways your family already does or plans to do this.

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# **Our Guatemala Partnership**

### Travel Update: October 11 - 20, 2024

Work on our travel Itineraries in Guatemala has begun! Soon we will be able to update travelers with specifics on hotels, travel plans, and activities.

Discussions have also started on the design and build plans for the pews for Santa Cruz de la Esperanza, our partner congregation. Over the next several months, a design needs to be created that incorporates locally sourced materials, accounts for the skill and experience levels of the builders, and can be assembled with the available tools and hardware. We have 8 confirmed travelers for the village travel option this trip, including 3 new visitors to Santa Cruz de la Esperanza. We are very excited to be able to introduce more St. Michael's members to our partner congregation.

We currently have room for more travelers interested in the Guatemala City & Lutheran Center travel option this trip. All 4 travelers signed up for this group are new visitors to our Guatemala Partnership and include 1 youth and 1 young adult. As the number of travelers and travel plans are firmed up, we will be able to calculate the overall cost of the trip. Travelers: if you have not done so yet, please confirm your participation by a \$500 deposit (due April 30).

This month as we gather we will be reflecting on one of the texts for the upcoming Sunday: **Ezekiel 37:1-14** 




The hand of the LORD came upon me, and the Most High brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. The Lord led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. The Lord said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then the Lord said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD."

So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. Then the Lord said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." I prophesied as the Lord God commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

Then the Lord said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act, says the LORD."

This is an opportunity to reflect on the places where we see death, loss, and disappointment, and the ways that new life and possibilities may emerge. How might God be calling us to action? How might we experience new life in our own lives, in community, and in the world.

# A Church at Work

## **Church Council Corner**

The St. Michael's church council met on Tuesday, April 9 in-person.

As part of this meeting the council noted the letter from the Synod's Guatemala Committee outlining the partnership commitment for the year. St. Michael's includes this in our annual budget, so no council action is needed.

**Correspondence and Membership:** There is conversation with some families about baptisms and new membership; and the Community Life Committee is looking at a new church directory later this year.

Finances: The Council received this months Financial Report. Overall everything is largely in-line with last year.

**Worship Conversations:** A significant portion of the council meeting was surrounding the Congregational worship conversation. The Children, Youth, and Family committee is holding two listening sessions with families about worship and children's activities over the next two weeks. The council members facilitating congregational conversations will be meeting over the next two weeks to plan for the May 5<sup>th</sup> conversation during the Religion in Life hour. The Pastors are also meeting with members, staff, and others and have been thinking through various ideas. The plan is to have 2-3 options for the congregation to review and provide feedback on at the meeting on May 5<sup>th</sup> conversation.

**Property:** The committee is looking at replacement of 3 more roof sections this summer. There are currently two bids, and the committee is reviewing. There is also work on grinding the stumps in the courtyard and on the lawn of trees that were removed last fall. Additionally, an electrical panel will be replaced in May.

Congregational Highlight: In light of the on-going work on the building as well as a commitment to service in the community, an anonymous gift has been made by a household in the congregation above and beyond the capital campaign. The gift includes \$125,000 to go towards building projects (roofs and potential solar panels), and \$25,000 to towards addressing social ministry needs (housing, food, outreach in the community). The council expressed thanks for this incredible gift and generosity.

The next council meeting will be held May 14, on-line.
